### MONTHLY COMMENTARY

The SA Listed Property Index (SAPY) and the All Property Index (ALPI) recorded total returns of -3.19% and -3.36% respectively for July, with the historic yield of the ALPI ending the month at 8.24%. The yield-to-maturity (YTM) on the Long-Term South African government bond (RLRS) stayed flat to end the month at 9.28% (9.28% - 30 June 2020). The relatively strong rebound in June of c.13% was short-lived as the SAPY and ALPI underperformed the other major asset classes in July. SA Equities were the best performing asset class (2.56%), followed by SA Bonds (0.61%), SA Cash (0.42%), and SA Listed property (-3.19%). SA Listed Property (SAPY) continues to underperform other asset classes on a rolling 12-month period (-41.19%), with SA Cash outperforming with returns of (6.66%), followed by SA Bonds (4.25%) and SA Equities (1.58%).

Globally, the FTSE EPRA/NAREIT Developed Rental Net Total Return Index, recorded a net total USD return of 3.47% for July. The best performing listed real estate market was the United Kingdom, which recorded a total USD return of 8.57% for the month. Hong Kong recorded the lowest total USD return of -10.83%, on the back of renewed political uncertainty. The divergence in year-to-date returns of the various sub-sectors is unmistakable and talks to the benefit of active asset management and superior stock selection for alpha generation. Year-to-date ended 31st, July 2020, the Catalyst Global Real Estate UCITS Fund (the "Fund") returned -9.75% while the Benchmark returned -18.64%, resulting in the outperformance of 8.89% year-to-date.

The Flexible Fund's offshore allocation is approximately 49% on a see-through basis. We expect continued volatility to persist in the SA property sector in the short to medium term as government and private sector navigate through the impact of COVID-19 on the economy and their respective businesses. At this stage we expect many funds to either reduce, defer, or not pay dividends to meet short term cashflow requirements. This will be driven by the ability or affordability to pay and potential rules relaxation by regulators regarding tax and REIT status.

The JSE, together with the Financial Sector Conduct Authority (FSCA), made a ruling that no blanket dispensation will be granted by the JSE and that an extension of two months will be granted to companies with year ends between 29th February 2020 & 30th September 2020. The global real estate investment opportunity set remains diverse. We consider this diversification within the Fund, not only from a geographic perspective but also from a sub-sector basis to be attractive. Our projected 5-year earnings growth for global real estate is significantly above expected inflation, with reasonably high visibility on the back of long-term leases. Overall, the global sector is showing upside given our return requirement.

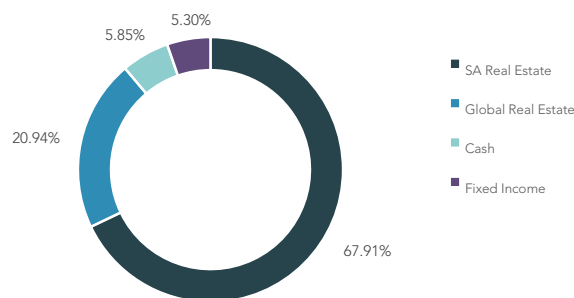

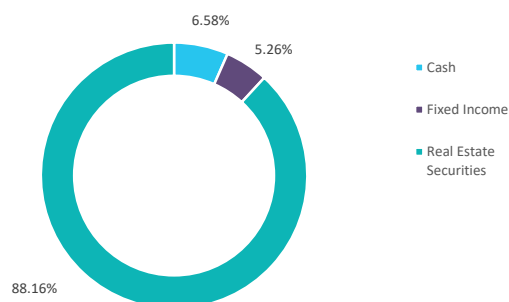
